From the Editors

We are excited to have the opportunity to send out the Unit 174 Newsletter. We have worked together for several years, identifying information that from the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* that may be useful, especially to I/N players. The last several years of these monthly summaries are available here, on the WBA website.

Bridge Bulletin ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

This month the choice came down between Eddie Kantar's column on playing to make your contract and August Boehm's column on bidding with a void. We chose Eddie Kantar's column on page 53.

This is a hand scored in IMPs. We prefer IMPs scoring to match point scoring as we like the idea of playing, as declarer, to make contracts, and, as defenders, to defeat them. Match point scoring encourages players to take calculated risks to collect overtricks.

The bidding is fairly routine. Both North and South have lots of losers and from the bidding it's clear that the opponents have about half the high cards.

After the defense takes the heart AK and a heart ruff and the CA is still out, we are very happy not to be in 4H. East returns the C3 after getting the heart ruff. It is now time for the key play.

How do we play the club suit?

Normally we would play the opener for the CA; he is presumed to have the stronger hand. However, opener has already shown up with the heart AK and responder has something for his 1N response. So the CA could be in either opponent's hand.

We like to make our contracts. In IMPS there is a heavy premium on doing so. Our only chance to make this contract is to avoid losing a diamond. Therefore, the DK needs to be onside, as there is nowhere for us to pitch the second diamond loser from our hand (the first, obviously, goes on the DA). So we mentally place the DK with West and play for that layout.













If West has the DK, the only way that East can have enough points to respond 1N is if East holds the CA. So, we "give" East that card and play accordingly. We rise with the CK and it wins. We pull trump and lose only one club, two hearts and a heart ruff, making 3H.

Now, if East had held the DK, we were going down no matter what we did. Down two instead of down one is not big stuff in IMPS.

TO PULL TRUMP OR NOT TO; THAT IS THE QUESTION

Below are some points worth consideration when you are trying to decide whether or not to pull trump:

--- 1 ---

If you're not trumping losers in the hand with fewer (or sometimes the same number) of trumps, you usually pull trump. Conversely, if you have losers to trump in the short hand, don't pull trump to the extent where you no longer have trumps left to trump your losers. Players who don't think through the whole deal hope that the losers will disappear magically. They don't. Course there are deals where you can pitch your losers on a long suit (from the hand with the shorter trumps). Pull trump if you can eliminate the losers another way.

--- 2 ---

Do not pull trump if by doing so you will lose control of the hand. Sometimes you'll be playing in a trump suit where you don't have as many trumps as you would like. Or, you will get a bad split where you have to avoid running out of trumps because you need them to prevent the defense from running its long suit.

--- 3 ---

Don't underestimate the defenders. A decent defender can see shortness on the board and can count the number of trump on the board. They will figure out that you plan to trump in dummy and will lead trump at every opportunity to prevent this. Pull only the number of trump you can afford to while setting up your dummy to ruff the losers. You may have to decide between leaving some opponents' trump out, so that you can set up your dummy ruffs, and the risk that the opponents will use those outstanding trump to ruff your winners in other suits. If it's possible to discard the losers on a long suit, do that, rather than ruffing in dummy.













--- 4 ---

Does it look like the opponents are about to ruff your winners? If so, you almost have to pull trump. If they lead a suit you have in which you are long, it's a good chance the lead is a singleton and the ruff is coming.

--- 5 ---

If it seems unlikely that the opponents are ruffing any time soon, and you have a two-way finesse in the trump suit (usually for the queen), delay playing trump until you have explored as much as possible so that you can make an intelligent decision as to which way to finesse. Sometimes you can tell by discards and high cards played who is more likely to have the missing honors. Sometimes their body language will help you.

Examples

Don't pull trump until you've ruffed your small spade (then play a small trump toward your KQT):
















Fortunately, East led the S5. It would be hopeless if they took three heart tricks immediately. Pull trump as fast as you can. Then take the diamond finesse, as you need a third diamond winner on which to pitch a losing heart. It's a free shot; if it doesn't work you'll pitch a losing club later. But it works.



Don't pull trump until you find out if you need to trump a club. They led the S3. I went up with the A and took a ruffing finesse in spades. Then I led a low club to the Q, and East made it easy for me by rising with the CA. Because now know that I do not have to ruff a club, I can pull trumps.
