## President's Message

At our August sectional, our unit tested out utilizing hand records during the team games and received considerably more positive feedback than not. Those providing their concerns and suggestions created learning opportunities for the board.

By way of the compliments, we had many regarding the wonderful instructions provided at each table, that playing many of the same boards as the pair game made it easy for all to review hands, and that by playing many of the same hands it made the competition more equitable.

The primary complaints were related to board movement delays, slow play, and players discussing boards in front of others who'd not played them yet. Some people preferred the way "it's always been" as shuffle and deal to having any record with which their partners and teammates would want to review afterwards.















In the pair games, the question has come up as to how pairs might play more of the same boards to allow for more equity across-the-board based on the number of tables per section. Based on your input, here are two initial ways we are addressing the above in an effort to continuously improve and provide the best experience possible for our diverse membership:

- ♦ At our fall Sectional, we will be running our pair sessions using 26-27 boards and a web movement where appropriate.
- In 2020, we are considering again using hand records during team games on a limited basis at another Sectional with improvements including time clocks, additional caddy service and reminders to not discuss hands until end of session except when comparing hands with teammates.

As many of you know, board member **Daniel Jackson** has accepted a new job in San Antonio and will be leaving Unit 174. I would like to commend and thank Daniel for his work on the board. He continually brought new ideas to consider implementing for the benefit of our members. He was the driving force behind using the pre-made Swiss Team boards at the August sectional and saw to it that we had the instructions appreciated by so many players. ## I/N AMBASSADORS FOR FIRST-TIME TOURNAMENT PLAYERS

#### What is an I/N Ambassador?

This is an ACBL Player with 5-299 Masterpoints who will be available as a one-time partner for games during regional and sectional tournaments. The I/N ambassador is ready to play with a 299er first-time tournament attendee who does not have a partner but wants to begin playing tournament Bridge. We hope that the First-Timer will have a great time, learn a little about tournament Bridge and find a regular partner who enjoys the high energy of these large events!















#### How the system works

A first-time tournament attendee with fewer than 300 Masterpoints may go to the I/N Table and register for a Free Play (good for one game). If the First-Timer comes with a partner, he or she picks up the Free Play coupon and they proceed to playing area where the Free Play coupon can be used in lieu of cash for one player for one session. If the First-Timer does not have a partner, he or she notifies the I/N Table Staff that a partner will be needed. If another First-Timer shows up, they will be paired together. About 15 minutes before a game is to start, if no other single First-Timer shows up, the Ambassador will partner the First-Timer for that one game.

## From the Editors

We are excited to have the opportunity to send out the Unit 174 Newsletter. We have worked together for several years, identifying information that from the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* that may be useful, especially to I/N players. The last several years of these monthly summaries are available here, on the WBA website.

## **Bridge Bulletin ARTICLE OF THE MONTH**

We chose Robert Todd's column on page 46 as the article of the month. Todd discusses how the shapeliness (or lack of it) should be factored into the decision to open with a pre-empt. Many players end their analysis on preempts after looking at the length and quality of their long suit. That is only a starting point.

How the rest of the hand is distributed is also a factor as to how many tricks you will take. The trick-taking ability of the hand is an important factor when preempting. The flatter your hand, the worse it is. Conversely, the more shapely your hand, the better it is.















In the first two columns, Todd compares two hands where the distribution differs by only one card, but that one card makes all the difference. The first hand is 6-2-2-3, the worst possible distribution of a hand with a six-card suit. The second hand is 6-1-3-3, a better distribution. This hand is a better trick taking/preemptive hand than the first hand, as it allows for a possible ruff of the third diamond in dummy.

In the third column, he discusses 6-4 hands. We teach the same thing he does: many 6-4 hands are so good for preempting that you should consider treating them like a seven-card suit. This is typically true when your long suits are where your high cards are. The first hand, which has 6-1-4-2 distribution, a strong six-card suit and a decent 4 card suit, should be opened 3S.

He concludes with a discussion of 7-2-2-2 hands. A 7-2-2-2 hand with three worthless doubletons can be opened 2S instead of 3S.

### **UNBLOCKING**

Unblocking—purposefully ridding a hand of high cards—is a technique used so that

1. Partner's hand, which contains length, can win more tricks. A suit is said to block when the short hand wins a trick with its last card in the suit and is unable to return the lead to partner who has established winners in the blocked suit.

OR

2. Partner can get on lead make a lead that works well only from partner's side.

Being able to reach partner's hand is referred to as "keeping communications open."

We are defending a notrump contract. Partner leads the K in a suit where our holding is Ax. Now what?

The first thing we would do is to make a note to tell partner afterwards that it's poor bridge to lead the K when we hold Ax. A good partner should magically be able to see our Ax through the backs of the cards and know to lead low (yes, we are just kidding).
















To play decent defense, we have to trust partner. So if partner leads the K against a notrump contract, he should have a suit headed by the KQJ or the KQT. The standard play for us is to overtake the K with the A and lead it back.

Course it wouldn't hurt to look at dummy. If dummy has the Q, it would be foolish to play the ace. If dummy has Jxxx it would also be foolish to play the ace as we would be turning three tricks into two.

Similarly, when partner leads a Q against a notrump contract, he is promising a suit headed by QJT or QJ9. Holding Ax and assuming we don't see the K in dummy, we play the A and return the suit, through declarer's K.

And if partner leads a Q, dummy has the A, and we have Kx, the correct play is to drop the K under dummy's A. The idea is the same: keep communications open with partner.

However, these are general guidelines that work most of the time, but not all the time.



Consider this Larry Cohen deal. You are sitting East, defending 3N by South in an IMPS scoring event. Partner leads the HQ, the dummy is faced and, you are looking at the cards pictured at left.

You can see that NS has eight tricks off the top in the North hand: seven diamonds and the HA. If South has either black ace, NS will have their ninth trick and the contract cannot be defeated. So you must play partner for both black aces. Partner

is doing a similar exercise when dummy is faced. He counts the same eight tricks in dummy. From partner's perspective, if South has the HK, NS will have their ninth trick and the contract cannot be defeated. So he must play you for the HK.

The winning defense is this: when declarer lets partner in with one of the black aces (likely the CA, as dummy's holding is solid after that), partner leads low to your HK. You return the SQ and it's curtains for the declarer.

Aren't you glad you didn't play the HK at trick 1? It's your only entry.








