Club News

Below please find information reported to us by the clubs in our Unit. Please send your club's news to Jeff Kroll at texas.blue.hen@gmail.com. Information on all our clubs is available on the Unit 174 website. Check there for the most up-to-date schedules, results and other news.

Houston area bridge clubs are currently closed, but several have an online presence (a "virtual club" or "vClub") on Bridge Base Online (BBO).

You can support your club by playing on BBO (www.bridgebase.com). If you play at one of the Houston virtual clubs (see list below), a majority of the table fees go to that club and you get black (Club) points.

If your club does not have an online virtual club, ACBL is offering three special daily online pairs game where you can win black (Club) points -- at 9am, 4:10pm and 6:30pm (Central time). And the majority of your table fee will be returned to your local club. Look for the **ACBL SYC** games on BBO.

A POINT ABOUT POINTS

ACBL is increasing by 50% the points won in virtual club (vClub) games. These points are not visible on BBO but are visible in ACBL Live. So, if you have earned 1.00 master points in your BBO vClub game, ACBL will bump it up to 1.50 master points in their records and will display the augmented total in ACBL Live. This "bump up" is for vClub games only; not for ACBL SYC games.

APPLE DBC

Apple Duplicate Bridge Club is running open pairs games on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 3pm.

BRIDGE CLUB OF HOUSTON

The Bridge Club of Houston is running open pairs games every day and I/N games every weekday. Visit the club website for game times.

BBO Search Term: BCOH

CLEAR LAKE / GALVESTON

The Clear Lake and Galveston clubs have combined to form an online "virtual club". They are running open pairs games on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10am.

We are excited to have the opportunity to send out the Unit 174 Newsletter. We have worked together for several years, identifying information that from the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* that may be useful, especially to I/N players. The last two years of these monthly summaries are available here, on the WBA website.

Bridge Bulletin ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

This month's article of the month is the "Mike's Bridge Lesson" by Mike Lawrence on page 56. Lawrence discusses what to play to trick one in the third seat, in front of declarer. Partner has led the SJ and a low card is played from dummy. East can let partner win the trick or overtake.

Based on the auction, East knows that declarer has a singleton spade: East has five, dummy has three and West, based on his bid, has four. EW play support doubles; holding only three spades, West would have made a support double instead of bidding 2S. The only entries to East's hand are in the spade suit. So the only way East will have an opportunity to lead through declarer is to win the first trick.

We typically want to lead through strength toward weakness. "When the dummy's on your right, lead to the weakest thing in sight..." There is weakness in dummy: the club suit.





Furthermore, partner bid clubs. Winning the first trick creates the only chance East has of leading through declarer's high cards into partner's suit.

As it turns out, declarer has K86 in front of partner's AQJ9. East wins the spade and shifts to the CT. Whether or not declarer goes up with the CK at trick two, EW are getting three club tricks and their spade trick to set the contract.

Another consideration is timing. Let's assume the SJ holds and West leads another spade. Declarer will ruff it and might be able to establish ten tricks before EW get in again.

In another example, the same shift is necessary. In the second case, declarer holds KQx of clubs and partner holds the DA. EW get the same spade trick, the DA and two club tricks to set the contract.

We also considered these articles:

- "Lesson Learned" by Michael Berkowitz, Page 55. The author explains how to use the bidding to figure out partner's point count and distribution.
- "Challenge of the Month", Page 60. The reader is challenged to declare a contract so that there is a 50% chance instead of a 0% chance of success.



DO DECLARER'S EYES DECEIVE HIM (OR HER)?



We are sitting South and do not have a bid after 1C-P-1H. A double would show at least four spades and suggest at least four diamonds. The diamonds are not good enough to overcall at the two-level. The hand is not strong enough for 1 NT. So, pass it is.

At our second turn to bid, the auction is up to 3S. No way we are bidding over that, so we are defending 3S.

Partner leads the CT, which we hate. We know partner is not underleading an ace against a suit contract, and we know that when partner leads a ten that he denies the jack. So it looks like our CK is toast.

Declarer plays low from dummy. No sense in making it easy on declarer; we play the C9, hoping to make it look like we are starting a high-low, indicating a doubleton. As expected, declarer wins the CJ.

Declarer leads a low spade to the Q; we win the SA. We now lead the C4 to complete the deception that we started with a 9-4 doubleton. Declarer believes us and rises with the CA. We later win the CK, depriving EW of an overtrick and scoring an 85.7% board.



Declarer had to choose whether to trust us or our partner. By trusting our high-low, declarer assumed partner led the T from K T 6 -- certainly not a standard lead. Had we not played high-low, declarer would not have had to choose at all.

BBO TIPS, TRICKS & INFO

Houston bridge games have gone online and we have, too. Online clubs are referred to "vClubs" (for "virtual club"). Below please find information which may make your online path a little smoother and point out features which you may not have noticed. This is NOT an exhaustive list of everything you can do on BBO.

DISCLAIMER: The information presented here was obtained using a Windows-based PC. References to the location of specific screen elements might not apply to a tablet or to a computer with a different operating system. We have been told that it is much easier to set up and fund your account using a computer rather than a tablet.

Before you register for a vClub game

Before you even think about registering for a game, verify the following:

- There is a valid ACBL number in your BBO profile (and it is yours).
- There are enough BB\$ in your BB\$ account to cover the registration fee.
- You have logged into BBO using the red Play bridge now button in the middle of the screen and not the Login/Register button at the upper right.
- You have not logged in as Invisible (there is a checkbox for this option on the login page).

Verify (or add) your ACBL number to your BBO profile

- Log into BBO
- Under FEATURED AREAS, select ACBL World
- Click Update your ACBL number (button below game list
- If your ACBL number is not displayed enter it and click **Update**



Verify your BB\$ balance

When you log into BBO, there will be an orange message box displayed in the lower right corner of your screen. It will contain your Award symbol, Masterpoints (those earned on BBO) and BB\$ Balance. If the message box disappears before you have looked at it, click the BB\$ button at the top right (next to your BBO alias). You will be directed to the BB\$ site, which has its own login.

You can also access the BB\$ site directly from the BBO main page. After opening the main page, instead of clicking Play bridge now, click the BB\$ button in the upper right corner of the page.

Register for a vClub game

Registration for vClub games opens two hours before game time. Note that vClub games are classified as tournaments in BBO. Once logged in,

- Under PLAY OR WATCH BRIDGE, click **Competitive**
- Under TOURNAMENTS, click **ACBL Virtual Clubs**.
- Scroll down to find the tournament that you want OR click the **Search** button just above the **Entries** column to enter part of the game title.
- Once you can see your tournament, click the title of the tournament to launch the registration view.

IMPORTANT: both you and your partner must be online to register.

Tournament info during registration

When you click the title of a tournament, a horizontal menu is displayed across the top. The menu items each correspond to a different view of registration information:

Registration

This view is displayed by default and contains the registration form

Entries

This view displays the BBO aliases of the players who are registered for the tournament. Click on a BBO alias to view the player's real name

Partnership Desk

This view displays the BBO alias of anyone who has indicated he or she would like a partner. If you need a partner for the game, you can add your name here or arrange to play with someone else who needs a partner



Tools

The right panel of the BBO interface contains tools that are always present (unless you choose to hide them). The tools are present in form of tabs turned sideways down the right side of the page. Each tab has a set of horizontal menu items across the top of the tab. The tabs are:

Messages

This tab is displayed by default and within the tab, the **News** view is displayed by default. If there is a number next to the **Mail** menu item, it means that someone sent you a message when you were not logged in

People

The **Friends** view is displayed by default. The BBO aliases displayed are those players with whom you have a relationship status of "Friend" or "Follow". You can add a BBO alias to this list using the **Add Friend** feature at the bottom of the page. If you follow someone and he/she follows you , the relationship status is changed from "Follow" to "Friend"

• History

The History tab displays a listing the tournaments you have played on BBO. Click a tournament to view your results and to see the boards. You can replay each board, trick by trick, if you want to.

Account

The Accounts tab defaults to the **Profile** view. In this view you enter the information that other players see when they click on your BBO alias. In the **Settings** view, you can choose how you view BBO, what happens during play and what sounds you hear, among other things. It's well worth going through the entire list and ensuring that BBO is behaving as you want it to. You can change these settings at any time. The **Convention cards** view holds the convention cards that you play and identifies the partner with whom you play them. If you do not indicate a convention card, you are considered to be playing the ACBL SAYC.



During the game

When playing a game, the table is shown in the left panel and your tools are still in the right panel. Some not-so-obvious features...

The **blue box with three horizontal stripes**, usually at the upper left, contains a link to the convention card of each pair as well as a link to call the director.

As you probably aware, it is your responsibility to alert your own bids. There is an **Alert** button inside your bidding box. BEFORE making your bid, click the Alert button and then type the information. Then make your bid. It may be useful to create a document with standard alert phrases that you can copy and paste into BBO. For example, "transfer to hearts" or "forcing" or "15-17" or "4-card support and an opening hand".

The vClub games are barometer games, which means that everyone is playing the same board at the same time. The History tab (in the Tools pane on the right) has two menu items which are both interesting and distracting.

• My Table

This view displays the boards in play and your result on each. It's your private score. It also includes your percent score for each board and your overall percentage for the game. In the space beneath the scores, the auction and hands are displayed for the board selected in the upper section

Other Tables

The **Other Tables** view displays the results (across your tournament) for board selected in the **My Table** view. It's a traveler and presents the results from best to worst. So, if you want to see why your +420 was only an 11% board, you can do so here. And by moving through the rows, you can see who got the better boards, how the auctions went and even how the play went. As mentioned above, this page can be very distracting!

When you are in a game, there is a **Tables** tab added to your tools. The **Tables** tab lists all the tournaments -- it's the same list that you see when you go to register. The views listed across top are **Pending**, **Running** and **Complete**. If you click the **Running** view and open your tournament, you will see who is sitting at what table in what direction. So you can identify all pairs against whom you will be playing and all pairs against whom you will be compared. It's the equivalent of looking around the room before you start a live game.



Convention Cards and related information

As mentioned above, if you and your partner have a card that you want to play, you must place that card in your profile, attached to your partner's name BEFORE you and your partner register. Otherwise it will not be visible during the game.

When you arrive at a new table (or a new pair arrives at your table), it's helpful to let the opponents know about your leads and carding. This is another situation where a document from which you can copy and paste (into the Comments, this time) is handy.
