From the Editors

We are excited to have the opportunity to send out the Unit 174 Newsletter. We have worked together for several years, identifying information that from the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* that may be useful, especially to I/N players. The last few years of these monthly summaries are available here, on the WBA website.

Bridge Bulletin ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

We often are asked about whether to open a major or notrump when holding a balanced hand, a five-card major and a number of points appropriate for a notrump bid. Two of February's "Bidding Box" problems illustrate this question.

Problem 3, page 38

We hold 16 HCP, a fifth card in a good heart suit and 3-5-3-2 distribution, as flat as it gets when you have a five-card suit. Both contestants and the Bridge Bulletin auction chose to open this hand 1N as opposed to 1H. The reasons for the 1N opener are:

Rebid

Opening 1H sets up a rebid problem. What would we do over a likely 1S or 1N bid from partner? Over 1S, we would be forced to bid 2H as 1N shows about 11-14 points and 2N shows 19-20 points. Over 1N we would bid 2D which is an awkward bid: if we end up in notrump, it will be played from the wrong side – the weak hand. We need to think about our next bid before making this one.

Spade holding

We have three spades; we are happy to have partner transfer us to spades.

Tricks

Most of our points are face cards (as opposed to aces), which lends the hand to notrump. We have only 2 ½ quick tricks; most of our tricks will be slow and sure, once the opponents' high cards are out. This type of holding is better for notrump, since we can run our winners once they are set up.

Suit Quality

Our hearts are solid, they are likely to take the same number of tricks in notrump as hearts, and we need only nine tricks in a notrump game as opposed to ten in a heart game.

















Problem 4, page 38

We hold 20 HCP, a fifth card in a good spade suit and 5-2-4-2 distribution – could be flatter. Both contestants and the Bridge Bulletin auction chose to open this hand 1S as opposed to 2NT. The reasons for the 1S opener are:

• Rebid

We have an easy rebid; our hand is strong enough to jump shift into diamonds and the diamonds are strong enough to mention if need be.

Tricks

With two aces and 5 ½ quick tricks, this hand will play better in a suit. Quick tricks are often better in a suit, while slow tricks are often better in notrump.

Flaws

We have two flaws for a notrump bid. The first is a wide-open suit (clubs). The second is the two doubletons. We subscribe to Ron Klinger's guideline that it's OK to have one flaw for a notrump bid but not two.














VULNERABILITY MATTERS

Vulnerability can affect our first call in a standard auction. Consider the hand diagram at left. The auction proceeds as shown below. What action do we take with the North hand?

1S – 2H - ??

We have two options: Pass or 2S.

Pass

Pass does not necessarily show weakness, it just means we don't have a better bid right now. We fairly sure East will pass. Partner (South) has an opening hand; West should have an opening hand or close to it and we have nine. There are not a lot of points left for East.

When East passes, South must reopen to protect our hand. We hope South will reopen with a double (take out) which, looking at five hearts to the Q9 and the DA, we will convert to a penalty double.

2S

The North hand is not quite strong enough for a limit raise; the CQ is not really working. If the CQ were the SQ and there were a club void, a 3H cue-bid limit raise would be easy. Even with QJx in spades and a club singleton, it would be close enough for a limit raise. The actual holding does not merit a limit raise.

So, how do we evaluate these two options? We look at the vulnerability and the scores associated with each outcome.

We do expect to beat 2H, but can we beat it enough to get a better score than our spade game? We are vulnerable; they are not. Our vulnerable spade game (assuming it's there) is worth 620. We would have to beat 2HX by four tricks–100, 300, 500, 800– to get a good board. That's a tall order. We would bid 2S. At this vulnerability, it's more important to find our game, if it's there.

















Were the vulnerability reversed, we would pass, hoping partner will re-open with a double, which we will pass and convert to a penalty double. If they are vulnerable and we are not, we have to beat 2HX by only two tricks–300, **500**–to get a score better than the 420 we would get for our non-vulnerable game.

As the cards lie, EW is likely to take six tricks, for down two. So only the most favorable vulnerability, they vulnerable, we not, allows NS to profit by playing defense on this hand.
