The summer nationals that were to be played in Montreal have been cancelled. Hot off the press is the announcement of the North American Online Bridge Championships.















There will be a KO that will be played in two parts: Thu–Sun, Jul 23–26 and Thu-Sun, Jul 30–Aug 2. There is also a special pair event on Aug 1–2. Both events award NABC titles.

LONGEST DAY(S)

Houston-area clubs did a terrific job raising almost \$15,000 for the Alzheimer's Association during the two days of Longest Day games. All U174 virtual clubs donated net game fees and several clubs raised more through fundraising sites and other activities. These monies are in addition to the estimated \$700,000 that will be donated by ACBL.

Apple DBC raised \$1100.

The Clear Lake/Galveston virtual club (CLBC-GBC) raised \$3566.

Westside Bridge Academy (WBA) raised about \$5377. **Lauri Laufman** made a special effort to reach out personally to players in conjunction with the WBA effort.

DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Unit 174's 2020 charity is Dress for Success Houston (DFSH). For over 20 years, DFSH has provided business attire, job search skills and career advancement service to more than 44,000 women in the Houston area, including veterans.

From the Editors

We are excited to have the opportunity to send out the Unit 174 Newsletter. We have worked together for several years, identifying information that from the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* that may be useful, especially to I/N players. The last two years of these monthly summaries are available here, on the WBA website.

Bridge Bulletin ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

The July, 2020, article of the month is "Boehm on Bridge" by August Boehm on page 50. This piece is the fifth installment of Boehm's "Along the spectrum" series in which he discusses how to determine his "hand's value relative to other hands [he] might hold, consistent with [his] previous bidding." (*Bridge Bulletin*, March, 2020, p. 54)

In this situation you are South holding a two-point hand and partner has just made his third takeout double. Partner's first double shows about 11+; his second about 15+ and his third around 18+.

The auction, thus far:



Partner's hand probably looks something like this:



Your next action will be based on what your hand looks like and how you value it. Three possibilities include:



With this hand, you should be pleased to bid 4D. 4D might make. 3H doubled might make. It's cheap insurance to bid 4D. If 3H makes, your partner might be looking for a new partner after you fail to take out a takeout double.

















Here, you should pass and defend. You have little chance of making 4C or 4D unless partner has a monster hand. Since you are so flat, there is a good chance that enough of partner's high cards will cash and you will set the contract. There is also a chance that you'll get a spade ruff. Having three hearts cuts down the number of trumps East/West can have.



Now you have hit the jackpot. The fifth spade is big, the three hearts means that partner has a singleton heart, you have second-round control of diamonds, and your club holding suggests that you have a fit with partner in both black suits. Bid 4S and expect to make it. Don't invite when you have enough to go to game.

Other articles

Other articles that were considered:

- "The Bidding Box," Problem 1 (p. 30): This deal shows the need to show first- or second-round controls when investigating for slam. The *Bridge Bulletin* auction did a nice job. The contestants both got to a slam (one grand, one small) off two quick tricks.
- "The Real Deal" by Larry Cohen (p. 51) demonstrates how to plan carefully on a tight contract.















DON'T LET THEM PLAY 2M



Letting the opponents play in a known eight-card major-suit fit (five spades for opener and three for responder) at the two-level is losing/low-percentage matchpoint play. Maybe my 3H bid will work out badly, but I have little to lose as we are likely to get a bad result if I pass. By bidding, any of these three good results could happen:

- 1. The contract could actually make.
- 2. The score for going down is better than the -110 if the opps make 2S.
- 3. The opponents could go to 3S and go down.

Option 3 is what actually did happen. I led a spade, as I did not want dummy to ruff a heart winner. Eventually we took: one heart, two diamonds and two clubs. Five tricks for down one.

Declarer played it well to hold it to down one. It played clubs right away. North used its only entry, the CA, to return a heart. Now we can never stop declarer from ruffing a heart - which it did.

A strong defensive player ducks the CA, letting me win with the CK and return my last trump. Now, if declarer plays clubs again, North wins the ace and removes dummy's last trump. If declarer plays hearts, I win with the ace, play a club to North's ace and North plays its last trump. Down two.
