

President's Message



The New Year brings with it the winners of the *Ace of Clubs* and *Mini-McKenney* races. There is also a new kid on the block, the Online Points Race. What is that?

If you win points at a local club, the points won count both for the *Ace of Clubs* and *Mini-McKenny*. The same can be said for points won playing in an ACBL Support Your Club (SYC) game. Points won in an online tournament count only towards the *Mini-McKenney*.

There is another group of events on BBO, individuals with Robots or pairs with humans. One gets to these events by















clicking on ACBL World from the front page or the Instant Tournaments.

Points won playing in these events count towards the Online Points Race, but not towards Ace of Clubs or Mini-McKenny.

For all but the Pair events your partner and opponents are robots. Your true opponents are the other human beings sitting in your seat. Therefore, to succeed at robot bridge, you need to play better than your opponents, and you also need to outwit the robots.


The different types of robot games are:

ACBL **Daylong** tournaments (12/18 boards): Every day there are five tournaments (4 matchpoint and 1 IMP). You can take all the time you want to play 12/18 hands.

ACBL **Robot Duplicate** (12/18 boards): There are two (1 matchpoint and 1 IMP) every hour.

ACBL **Instant** Tournaments (12 boards). You can play any time of the day in a pair or IMP game. You have a limited time to finish the twelve hands.

ALERT! ALERT!

At the November meeting, the ACBL Board of Directors approved changes to the ACBL Alert Procedures. Some changes are described in the Red Alert article on page 35 of the January *Bridge Bulletin*.

Changes include, but are not limited to, the following:

- In an uncontested auction, no natural jump-shift is alertable.
- Support doubles and redoubles no longer require an alert.
- When making a transfer to a single suit, instead of saying "transfer", players now indicate the suit that is shown by the bid. If the bid is a relay to more than one suit, players still say "alert."
- Instead of saying "could be short" to describe a hand that could be opened with fewer than three cards in the suit bid, players now indicate the minimum number of cards that can be held. For example, "could be two" will be used for a typical short-club opening.

DIRECTOR COURSES AVAILABLE ONLINE

Online director certification courses will now be offered on a quarterly basis. The first ACBL Club Director Course will be taught January 23-24 from 10 am to 7 pm. Cost is \$50. The main emphasis of the course is to be able to direct at the club level. Contact **Melody Euler** (melody.euler@acbl.org) for more information.

TOURNMENT CANCELLATIONS

Due to the ongoing risk posed by the surging coronavirus and the slow rollout of the vaccine, the ACBL will not staff face-to-face bridge tournaments through April 30, 2021. The ACBL will announce by March 1 whether this moratorium will be extended. The cancellations include the Spring NABC, scheduled for March 11-21, and the Unit 174 Election Sectional, scheduled for April 16-18.




From the Editors

We are excited to have the opportunity to send out the Unit 174 Newsletter. We have worked together for several years, identifying information that from the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* that may be useful, especially to I/N players. The last few years of these monthly summaries are available here, on the WBA website.

Bridge Bulletin ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

The January, 2021, *Bridge Bulletin* article of the month is Mike Lawrence's "Who do you believe" on page 52. Lawrence walks through the inferences a defender uses to determine (1) the likelihood that partner has an entry and (2) whether or not to hold up when his suit is led. This situation comes up frequently.



Like any good partner, West leads the ◆3, partner's suit. East knows that West can't have a doubleton diamond, or West would play high/low. The only card lower than the 3 is the 2 and West is looking at that card in this own hand.

East plays the ◆K, and declarer plays the ◆J. Now what?

Sure, if declarer has a doubleton diamond, East can run all six diamonds. Although possible, that's unlikely as it supposes that South did not have a diamond stop for his 2N call after the 1 • overcall.

South's 2N bid shows 10-12 points, so NS has about the

23-25. East has ten points. That leaves about 5-7 points in the West hand. That makes it likely that West has an entry in hearts or clubs (East can see the AKQ of spades between dummy and his own hand).

So, the proper play is a low diamond, letting declarer win. Then East waits for partner to get in (or maybe East himself gets in with the $\triangle Q$). When partner gets in, knowing the $\triangle A$ was not cashed, partner will return his third diamond, setting the contract two.

The defense gets one club (West's entry) and five diamonds.















Other articles

Other articles that were considered:

- "Understanding Restricted Choice, by Dan McGuire (p. 26). When you are missing touching honors (often QJ) and one of them drops under your A or K, it decreases the likelihood that the opponent who dropped the honor has the other missing touching honor.
- "The Bidding Box", Problem 2 (p. 37). The Bridge Bulletin auction shows a natural bidding sequence to get to the top scoring partial contract missed by both expert pairs.
- "It's Your Call", Problem 2 (p. 40). Almost all (14 of 15) the expert panelists choose the cheapest forward-going bid to give partner room to cue bid the diamond control needed to bid slam.
- "Lessons Learned" by Michael Berkowitz (p. 48). Michael Berkowitz, shows the correct bidding sequence to bid the good slam. Then shows the need not to pull a second round of trumps to conserve the necessary entries to make the slam.
- "Better Bridge with Bergen" by Marty Bergen (p. 57). In the 18th part of the "Secrets of Hand Evaluation" series, Bergen explains how to determine whether or not to upgrade a hand to a 2N open.
- "Test Your Play" by Eddie Kantar (p. 61). In Deal 1, the bidding shows that East has a near yarborough, making the play easy. Deal 2 demonstrates the need to keep the dangerous hand off lead.















GETTING BY WITH A LITTLE HELP FROM MY... OPPS



Sometimes we must depend on the kindness of the opponents.

	North	South	
	1♠	2 •	2/1 game-force
Sometimes you have to rebid a five- card suit as opener as the other choices are worse.	2♠	3N	Not looking to play in a minor, don't want to bid clubs now and advertise that I don't want a heart lead.

West leads the \$2, not wanting to lead from a tenace. I'm happy a heart wasn't led. I duck; East wins the \$K.

Not being a good sport, East returns a heart. I duck. West wins the jack. West now plays a club to the ♣A.

That uses up my only non-spade entry. I can play a low spade, let them win and hopefully then take four spades. I decide to play the spades from the top, hoping they will split 3-3 or the jack will come down doubleton. On the second spade, I get the bad news. So, I just cash my third high spade.

Well, the spades didn't work, but West pitched two diamonds on the high spades, making his holding shorter than mine. I now take the diamond finesse. It fails; West wins the ◆K.















West is persistent and continues with a club (again, I silently thank him for not playing hearts). I win the club. After I give West a diamond, my hand is now good. The contract makes - three spades, one heart, two diamonds (thank you, West), and three clubs) - for a 96.4% board.
