He was best known as the author of the inspirational book, *The Happiest Man on Earth*, and was described as "an inspiration and joy" by Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison.

But now I consider myself the happiest man on Earth. Through all my years I have learned this: life can be beautiful if you make it beautiful \ldots happiness is something we can choose. It is up to you."

Thinking Ahead By Thomas Rush

An interesting hand came up not long ago on BBO. Your hand is



That's right, you're 7-6 in the minors. After you say "Wow!" and look around the table, you realize that you are dealer with all vulnerable. What's your opening bid?

Perhaps there are several levels of players who picked up this hand. One might say, "I only have ten high card points, I can't open!" and so they pass.

The next might say, "I meet the rule of 20 (number of cards in two longest suits (13) plus high card points (10) total at least 20), so I can open, and I'll bid my longest suit and open 1C."

Another might say, "This hand has too much playing strength to pass, so I'll open 1C and reverse into diamonds." I suspect a lot of intermediate and advanced players might choose that auction. If you do, the auction goes like this:

What's your second call? You could reverse into diamonds here, but I have never heard of a reverse at the five-level. You sure don't want to pass partner when you have a void in his suit! You could bid 4NT and hope P takes it as asking him to bid a minor, but will he see it as an ace ask, and it lead to disaster? Last, you can bid 5C. Which option do you choose?

The point of this hand isn't what you do at this point, It's to encourage you to think about your rebid before you open 1C. Yes, you can reverse, and that's a nice option over, say, 1C - 1S, where you have room to bid 2D and probably even 3D and hint at your shape.

But you know two things before you make your first call: First, the

chance of a misfit is high. Partner may be nearly as stacked in the majors as we are in the minors -- and on misfits, we want to keep the bidding slow and probably low. Second, with you being so short (0-0!) in the majors, the opponents may have a big major-suit fit (and will, if your partner has a fit for one or both of your suits!) and you should expect them to be willing to preempt if their distribution is as wild as yours is.

Because of those two bits of knowledge, I am going to recommend that you consider taking the "low road" with this hand, and open 1D, planning to rebid in clubs and clubs again if you get the chance. It is true that you're showing a 6-5 or 6-6 hand with that sequence (rather than the 6-7 you might get to show if you open 1C), but my experience (and the actual auction we had) says that it's OK to treat this as a 6-6 hand for the sake of better accuracy and a better chance to show the 6-6, compared to almost no chance to be able to show the 6-7 shape.

My recommendations:

1. Think about how the auction might go before you bid, especially when you know the distribution is bonkers.

2. Be willing to make a practical bid that may distort your distribution a bit if it is likely to let you paint a more accurate picture of your hand than the scientifically accurate auction that you'll never get a chance to execute.

Thus, open 1D and bid your clubs as many times as necessary.

For those of you who want to know what happened at the table, we did not get a good board, and it's my fault (my partner held the 6-7 monster you see above). The hand was played 169 times in a recent ACBL 18-board game on BBO. You can see the traveller at

The contracts were all over the place -- from 7D (cold) and any number of diamonds or clubs by our side making (except for 6C, which typically fails), to different numbers of spades by our side failing, and many different heart contracts by the other side, taking nine tricks. The full hand:

October 2021 ACBL Bulletin Notes Jeff Kroll and Sam Khayatt

The articles that we think would be the most beneficial for most ACBL members are listed below. Three are described in more detail on the following pages.

1. "The Bidding Box," moderated by Josh Donn:

a. Problem 5 (p.40): Making a cue bid to show spades and a minor finds the excellent spade slam.

b. Problem 6 (page 40): Opening 1NT with the singleton Q to avoid a rebid problem finds the best contract: 2.

2. "Card Play 101" by Phillip Alder (p.46-47), deal #2: Keeping the dangerous hand off lead.

3. "Parrish the Thought by Adam Parrish (p 47): Making an inference to figure out what the defender has when he makes an unattractive lead.

4. "Lessons Learned" by Michael Berkowitz (p 50): Making lead directing calls.

5. "Ask Jerry" by Jerry Helms (p. 53): When to open 1NT with a five-card major. Think about your second bid before making your first. He detests bidding Puppet Stayman over 2NT openings.
6. "Challenge of the Month" (p 53, 57): Plan to discard losers, making the finesse unnecessary.

7. "Chalk Talk" by Eddie Kantar (p 54). Both deals are straightforward if you count your tricks.

8. "Mike's Bridge Lesson" by Mike Lawrence (p. 55): Making the contract via an end play.


9. "Better Bidding with Bergen" by Marty Bergen (p. 59): When to be aggressive in third seat.

10. "Bidding Matters" by Karen Walker (p. 60): when and when not to use Stayman holding a flat hand. While most writers

(Helms, this month and others in the past) advocate not

using Stayman with a flat hand, Walker identifies situations where it might work well.

11. "Test Your Play by Eddie Kantar (p. 61), Deal #1: Take all your chances.



Our favorite Hands Page 47, "Parrish the Thought" by Adam Parrish - Inferences from unattractive leads

West is a good player. Leading an unsupported ace is generally a poor lead against a suit contract. Course underleading an ace against a suit contract is even worse. So, why did West do it?


your K–Q, saving a loser.

West must not have had a decent, let alone good, lead to make or he

would not have led the ♣A. He is likely to have the other two missing aces, which would make them also unappealing. He might consider leading trump, but not holding Qxx. Assuming West to be a good player, we would play for West to have a holding similar to this: ♠A104, ♥Q76, ♠A876, ♣A54. So, we would finesse West for the

♥Q, ignoring the general rule of trying to drop it with only four cards out in the suit. If West were not holding the ♥Q, a heart lead would have been better than the ♣A. After trumps are in, we would lead a spade to the king, as we are playing West for the ♣A. If West


were not holding the A, a spade lead would have been better than the A. We end up losing the three aces and the
Q. Making three.



Page 53, "Challenge of the Month" - Discard rather than finesse

As long as you plan properly, 6 ♦ is cold, assuming there are no horrible splits. There is no need to take the 50%/50% spade finesse. Just win the ♣A and draw trumps. Then cash the ♠AK. If it's your lucky day the ♠Q will drop and you will make seven: 5 spades, 1 heart, 6 diamonds, and 1 club. Usually,

it's not your lucky day, and you will lose the AQ. Pitch your losing club on the third spade, and take the rest. Making six.



Page 61, "Test Your Play," Del #1, by Eddie Kantar -Take all your chances

This deal is from the advanced section, but there's nothing advanced about it.

"Take all your chances" is one of Kantar's favorite themes (It's also one of ours). When declaring a hand, note the various ways that you can develop the tricks

you need and then play so you can take as many chances as possible to make those tricks. Your opportunities for extra tricks are:

1. Lead a low diamond to the queen. If East has the
K, then your
Q will be good.

2. Diamonds could split 3-3, then dummy's 4th diamond will be good.

3. You can take the club finesse.

So, win the \bigstar K and pull trump with the \blacklozenge AQ. You then cash the \bigstar Q. Go to dummy with a trump and lead a diamond to the queen. If East

holds the \blacklozenge K, you have 12 tricks: three spades, two diamonds (A, Q), six hearts, and one club. Making six.

If East does not hold the \blacklozenge K, go to dummy with the \blacklozenge A, then make the key play of pitching your third diamond on the \blacklozenge A. Then play a third diamond from dummy and ruff. If both defenders follow, then dummy's fourth diamond is good and you have 12 tricks: three spades, two diamonds (A, 13th), six hearts and one club. Making six.

Finally, if the diamonds do not split, try the club finesse for two club tricks.

It's important to take the club finesse last because if it loses, you will go down as you would lose a diamond and a club.
