Counting at Bridge by <u>Jack Lavigne</u>

This article is about counting suit distributions and hand patterns at bridge. As a new player, I learned to count trumps.

Take this trump suit for example: KQ32 opposite AJ94

• I lay down the A and both opponents follow.

• I count: 4 have been played; I have 6; that is 10; there are three left.

• Now I play to the K and all follow.

• I count: 8 have been played; I have 4; that is 12; there is one trump out.

• I know that I must draw one more trump. That is good but places a demand on your energy and concentration.

A Better Way

or

There is a better way that expert bridge players use.

They have committed to memory *suit patterns*. They would look at the first example and mentally compute that the trumps must break either:

$$4-4-3-2$$

 $4-4-4-1$
 $4-4-5-0$

Understand that the expert doesn't generate these patterns, they are in his memory bank and available upon demand.

He lays down the A and when both opponents follow, the 4-4-5-0 suit pattern is removed. When all follow to the K the suit pattern must be 4-4-3-2, and he knows that one trump is out.

This same technique applies to all suits and further, to all *hand patterns*.

With practice (typically takes a couple of months) one can, toward the end of a hand, know how many cards each opponent holds in every suit! This can be extremely valuable.

Let's look at an example.

West opens 3 \blacklozenge and you end up in 7NT.

- North ♦ Kxx ♥ Axx ♦ KQx ♣ AJ86 South ♠ Ax ♥ KQJx ♦ AJx
- ♣ K1097

West leads the Q of spades and you count your tricks, 2 spades, 4 hearts, 3 diamonds, and 2 clubs, 11 tricks total.

Clearly, you must find the Q of clubs to emerge with 13 tricks. On the surface, with West long in spades, East figures to hold the longer clubs.

One might go ahead and play to the A of clubs and hook East for the Queen, but let's not rush into things.

Investigating what appears to be non-interesting suits sometimes gives valuable clues. Win the A of spades and note that East follows.

Next, play A and a heart to the K. West follows to the first heart but shows out on the second. The expert mentally notes that hearts are 1-3-5-4 around the table.

Now play the A and K of diamonds, West follows the first diamond but shows out on the second. Diamonds are 1-3-6-3 around the table.

Now pause and consider, if West holds 7 spades for his opening 3rd bid, then his distribution must be: that's right, he is 7-1-1-4 and holds 4 clubs.

To make sure, you lead a spade to the K and East shows out, pitching a diamond. Now it is 100%: West holds 4 clubs.

Lay down the K from your hand, and after East follows with a small club, lead the 10, and with complete confidence hook West for Q. Making 7NT.

Summary

Using suit and hand patterns is the easiest way to count. With practice, you will find that you have extra energy and concentration available to perform all the other challenging tasks required to be a master player.

For your reference, below is a subset of suit/hand patterns. They are grouped based upon the largest number of cards held. The frequency of occurrence and relative frequency of occurrence within each group are shown rounded to the nearest tenth.

Unless you want to impress your friends, don't bother memorizing these numbers. One should realize that the top five patterns are 4432 followed by 5332, 5431, 5442, and 4333. The top five account for slightly over 70 percent of all distributions.

September 2021 ACBL Bulletin Notes Jeff Kroll and Sam Khayatt

The articles that we think are the most beneficial to most players are:

1. "The Bidding Box" moderated by Josh Donn, Problem 6 (p. 38). The Bridge Bulletin auction shows how to reach the excellent 6S contract which both pairs missed. The key bid was cue-bidding clubs twice to show a void.

2. "It's Your Call" by Sue Munday and Karen Walker, deal 1 (p.4). In an auction that has a double call that is not clearly defined but does show extra values, the majority of the panel bids 3NT with a stopper in the opponent's suit (spades).

3. "Parrish the Thought by Adam Parrish (p. 45) explains the logic in declaring when the defense gets off to a lead you don't expect.

4. "Reasoning with Robert" by Robert Todd (p. 46), explains how playing responder's 1NT response to a major as being semi-forcing has advantages.

5. "Lessons Learned" by Michael Berkowitz (p. 48) explains when to duck and the importance of ducking in tempo.

6. "Ask Jerry" by Jerry Helms (p. 51) explains game-suit help tries and that honors are worth more together than scattered.

7. "Mike's Bridge Lesson" by Mike Lawrence (p.52) discusses when to force declarer to ruff. By paying attention to your partner's carding, you can return a card that your partner will either win or ruff.


Our favorites

Page 38, "The Bidding Box," Problem 6, by Josh Donn—Cue bidding

A splinter, showing at most one club, at least four spades, and enough for game. With a known 11 card spade fit and a decent five-card side suit, West knows there is enough for a spade game, and maybe a spade slam if the hands fit	4 ★	4	Cue bid, showing a diamond control. Page 45, "Parrish the Thought" by Adam Parrish-Why that lead?




The double of the 2♠ bid is lead-directing. Holding the♠A, declarer knows West does not have to consider leading or under-leading it. Looking at his hand and dummy, the declarer can see that it is unlikely that West has a

nice club holding. So, the &4 must be a singleton.

Declarer must win the A and immediately draw trump. Allow the defense the K and discard the losing spade on the J.





West, leads the ♣A, picking up the ♣3, ♣2 and ♣4

The A is the proper lead. When we have four or more trumps, we typically do *not* want to
 Q108642 ruff. We want to force declarer to ruff in the longhand. Our goal is to get to a point where our trump holding is longer than the declarer's and so the declarer loses control of the hand. The 3 would be a poor lead.

East should follow with the ♣2. The queen is too important a card to use as a signal on trick one. Many partnerships have an agreement that playing a queen under a partner's ace promises the jack or shows a singleton.

Neither applies here.

West, having seen all the club spots except the AQ and AB, evaluate the suit. Holding three clubs (AQ82), East would have raised the 2A bid to 3A. Holding the AB2 doubleton, East would have played the AB on the first trick, not the A2 (assuming standard signals). So, East started with either the AQ2 doubleton or the A2 singleton.

Whatever East's holding, West now needs to play a low club. East will either win the AQ, if he started with AQ2, or will ruff if he started with the A2 singleton. Note that we *do* want to ruff in the East hand – the EW hand that is short in trump.

In this case, East would win the AQ and return heart, leading toward the weakness in the board. West would continue clubs at every opportunity, eventually setting the contract two or three.
