Member Extraordinaire: John Taylor


After a recent Wednesday morning Open Pairs Game at the Clear Lake Bridge Club (CLBC), I was able to spend some time speaking with John Taylor.

John was born on January 4th, 1925 in Saratoga, Texas. He was born into a family with one son (John) and seven daughters.

John spent his preschool and elementary through high school years in Saratoga graduating from Saratoga High School as valedictorian in 1942. His academic prowess at Saratoga earned him a partial scholarship to Texas A&M where he began his college career. After finishing his first year at Texas A&M, John was drafted into the US Navy in 1943.

Following boot camp, he was chosen to join the Naval V-12 program which trained enlisted men to become officers. John began his V-12 training at Tulane University in New Orleans. But, after one year at Tulane, John was sent to Harvard University where he was assigned to Advanced Naval Training. He was commissioned into the Navy as a 20-year-old Ensign in 1945.

After serving in the Navy at Subic Bay in the Philippines as a paymaster, he was honorably discharged from the Navy in 1946. After his discharge, John went back to Tulane to finish his degree and graduated from Tulane with a BBA in 1947.

John's first job as a college graduate was with Shell Oil Company in downtown Houston. Soon after, he moved to Mississippi and went into private business.

In 1959 John moved to Pasadena, Texas and began working for Lubrizol where he retired in 1990.

John married Theresa Poythress in 1954 and they raised three daughters. He and Theresa were married for 60 years until her death in 2014.

At the age of 50 when John wasn't working, raising daughters and playing bridge, he started painting after taking some classes.

Kingwood Duplicate Bridge Club has added a second game on Thursday starting September 8!





The following list identifies the articles that we believe will most benefit our readers.

- "Ruling the Game" by Matt Koltnow (p. 38). The new convention card has an error. "The box for Gerber after suits should be RED. If Gerber is used outside of a notrump sequence (opening notrump or opener's rebid of notrump) or immediately after a notrump bid, it is "Alertable".
- "The Bidding Box" moderated by Josh Donn, Problem 8 (Lair/Passell) (p. 43). After a 3* response to his 2* opening bid, Lair bids 3NT despite holding five spades to the AK. This bid was intelligent, as it gave Passell room to make a good bid. If Lair had bid spades, Passell could be in an awkward position. The 3* bid shows a long, strong club suit; Passell is unlikely to hold the stoppers to bid 3NT if he cannot support spades.
- "It's Your Call" by Sue Munday and Karen Walker, Deal 2 (p.42). In the uncontested auction 1 ← -1 ♥ | 3 ← - 3 ♠, it is important to know what 3 ♠ means. Most panelists play it as asking for a stopper in spades.
- "Card Play 101" by Phillip Alder (p. 48). Sometimes it is necessary to trump your partner's winner to ensure that you set the contract.
- "Parrish the Thought: Leading after preempting" by Adam Parrish (p. 49). "Don't preempt and then lead a doubleton." This practice is a good general agreement to have with partner. It ensures that when a preemptor leads a suit other than his/her own, partner knows what to do.
- "Reasoning with Robert: Overcalls opposite a passed hand" by Robert S. Todd (p. 50). Overcall more aggressively when partner is a passed hand, particularly if your suit is spades. A 1♠ bid can be very obstructive. A previously-passing partner is unlikely to raise the bid too high.
- "Challenge of the Month" (p. 54). Use the auction to determine the best line of play. When an opponent makes a first-position weak-two bid, that bid almost always shows a six-card suit.
- "Chalk Talk" by Eddie Kantar (p 57).
 - Deal 1: Playing IMPS, if you need an opponent to hold a specific card (the ♥K in this case), play the hand as if it is held by that opponent.
 - Deal 2: Making this hand requires a strip and end play.
- "Test Your Play" by Eddie Kantar (P. 63).
 - Deal 1: Play fr split honors.
 - Deal 2: All the losers are in the trump suit.
 Run the long diamond suit to limit the defense to just three spades.

Our Favorites



When an East opens the bidding 2♦, that bid normally shows a six-card suit.

West leads the ◆6. Since East preempted 2 ◆ and North/South hold six diamonds, the ◆6 is almost guaranteed to be a singleton.

South wins the ace and pulls three rounds of trump. West started with three trump and East started with one. This shape is usual. Four cards, typically split 3-1 and the

opponent (East) with the long suit is likely to have fewer cards in other suits.


To make this hand Declarer needs to discard a diamond on a spade. The best chance of making this contract is to play West for the A – which is likely as East preempted diamonds. South assumes at this point that West holds only black cards: the diamond was a singleton and all the trump have been drawn.

South plays the &K and overtakes it in dummy with the ace. Next, South plays the &K from dummy and pitches a diamond. West wins with the &A and must play either a spade or a club.

If West plays a spade, the \(\bigsig \)Q is played from dummy and South can pitch the last diamond.

If West plays a club, South will play the ♣10 from dummy. East will cover with the ♣J. South will win the ♣Q, which establishes the ♣9 as an entry t dummy and now South can play dummy's ♠Q.

"Test Your Play" by Eddie Kantar, Deal 2 (p. 63)



North/South start with only three losers – all in the trump suit – and can only lose those tricks to make the contract.

West leads the ♥Q.

North needs to protect against losing control of the hand if spades are split 4-1.

North wins the ♥A and then plays a small spade to dummy's ♠A. When both West and East follow

suit, North can breathe easier.

With three outstanding spades losers – the three losers counted when the plan was made, the contract is home free. North cashes the winners, allowing the opponents take their three spades whenever they want.


Maybe this deal did not need to be in the advanced player section?

Reading the Auction to Determine the Line of Play

Strip and End Play

A strip-and-end-play is a standard device used by declarer to force defenders either to play a card that gives declarer a ruff and a sluff or to lead into a tenace. The "strip" part is declarer removing all the safe exit cards from the defenders. The "end play" part is the defender winning a trick and having to lead a card that is favorable for declarer. An end play is sometimes called a "throw-in" play.

On this board, East bid, forcing a favorable lead at trick ten.

The Play

Robot games are human-declare games. Even if the robot names the suit first, the human at the table plays the hand.

East led the \$9. Given the 2\$ preempt, it is unlikely that East is leading from the \$K. And it is likely that the \$9 is a singleton. So, declarer (North) hopped up with the \$A.


Based on the auction, West must be void in spades. All 13 spades are accounted for in the other hands: East has six (for the preempt) and four are in South's hand leaving three in North's hand. Without the preempt North would plan to finesse twice in spades, hoping that West has at least one of the missing honors. With the information from the preempt, that was not a realistic option.

North pulled trump, led a heart to the ♥A, ruffed a heart, and threw in West with the ♣K.

West exited with a club, won in the North hand. Another heart ruff gets back to the South (dummy) hand.

A spade was led to the AQ, losing to the K. We knew East would win. Now the contract is secure; East must give us two spade tricks or a ruff and a sluff:

- If East leads a spade, North scores both the ♠A and the ♠T in the North hand.
- If East leads a heart, it is ruffed it in the South hand and the ♠T is pitched from the North hand.



Weak Two-Bids and Four-Card Majors

Jeff Kroll and I are fans of the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin* columnist Jerry Helms. Two of his "Jerryisms" are:

1. Look for a reason to bid and not an excuse to pass.

2. Make the bid that best describes your hand.

So, we agree with East's 2♠ bid. Preempts are most effective when they are made as early as possible. Yes, we will miss a heart fit some of the time. But four hearts to the ♥J9 is not a great suit, and East wants to clog the auction as much as possible after partner has passed. East is reasonably sure that NS has a vulnerable game and East would like a spade lead on defense (course that's not happening on this deal). If the hearts or the hand were good enough, we would make a takeout double.
